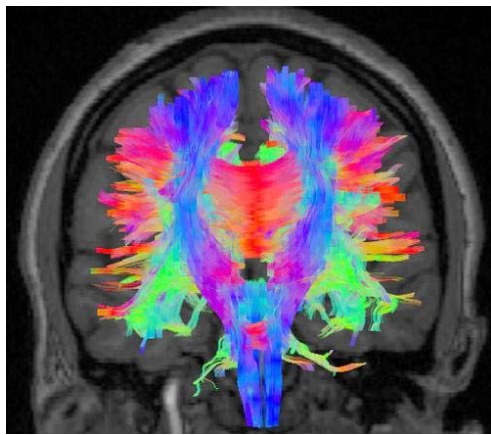

A good radiologist is someone with good clinical understanding of the disease process. We will therefore address the topics of paediatric neuroradiology, as we meet our patients every day, from the clinical perspective.

The language of the course is English. As the quality of existing literature in paediatric neuroradiology is excellent, there will be no syllabus presented. Each major lecture will be presented in a short abstract highlighting the most important points to be covered. This course in paediatric neuroradiology is aimed at radiologists, paediatric radiologists and neuroradiologists in practise or in training and at paediatricians with an interest in neurology and neonatology.

The purpose of the Scandinavian Postgraduate Course in Paediatric Neuroradiology has in the past been to give a broad understanding of paediatric neuroradiology as a clinical speciality. The topics will be focused and concentrating on subjects in which the development has been particularly rapid or interesting during the last couple of years.

- Neonatal neurology & neuroradiology
- Neuro-cutaneous syndromes
- Trauma and child abuse
- Hydrocephalus and CSF physiology
- Epilepsy
- Cerebral palsy
- Neuro-metabolic diseases
- Stroke

The faculty includes some of the world's most renowned paediatric neuroradiologists and clinicians with an expertise in the areas of neonatology, paediatric neurology and paediatric neurosurgery. Most teachers will be present during the entire course and act as discussants together with the course attendees inside as well as outside the lecture hall.
